MEMBER BOOK REVIEW by Ceila Ecker

Cars, Castles, Cows and Chaos

Have you ever dreamed of retiring in Italy, enjoying la vita bella. For a New Jersey couple the dream became a realty when they sold everything and moved to Italy for half the year. In Cars, Castles, Cows and Chaos, Midge Guerrero recounts the arduous days of packing up, the emotional decisions of what to leave behind and the adventure of making the dream a six-month reality.

The plan is for Midge and her husband, Jack, to rent a home in her ancestral town of Pontelandofo nella provincial di Campania, midway between Napoli and Campobasso. In her memoir, Midge highlights the challenges of not visiting, but rather living in Italy.

Midge and Jack's greatest challenge revolves around securing a car for their stay, navigating the roads, and understanding the codice della strada. Renting a car from a large company is out of the question because of the cost but Midge's cousin knows a guy. The soldi in nero (under the table) transaction requires no license, no insurance, and no credit card. In year three, Midge and Jack undergo the more stringent 30-day process of buying a car.

Affectionately named Fernando, their FIAT becomes the source of many adventures. On the road close to their town, Midge and Jack find themselves stuck in halted traffic as a giant clawed, bare teeth animal dashes between cars. Believed to be, by the shouting locals, a wolverine, it's not. There are none in Italy. It was probably a no less scary Marsican Bear.

We've all heard stories about aggressive drivers on the autostrade, but nonetheless, Midge and Jack are shocked to see drivers slam on their brakes and then race off again. Apparently, the autovelox, traffic cameras, are not discreetly hidden, everyone knows where they are and reacts accordingly. The GPS also announces controllo elettronico della velocita. But Jack still manages to get a ticket and they spend an entire afternoon in the ufficio postale waiting to pay the fine.

Once again, on a road adventure, Midge and Jack travel to the North. Midge comments on the wind turbines that are such a fixture in the southern Italian landscape but are nonexistent in the North. As Midge surmises, this is a result of no wind in the North not a difference in politics.

Cars, Castles, Cows and Chaos is a quick read about being an American of Italian descent living on Italian soil. It's an adjustment in many ways but Midge lightens the challenges with her sense of humor and love for all that is Italian.

From the Smithsonian Magazine

Archaeologists excavating the ancient city of Pompeii have uncovered a gorgeous still-life fresco depicting a platter covered in food and wine, including one food item that looks suspiciously like a pizza.



Reader: It's not a pizza. Traditional pizza has tomato and mozzarella on it, as the Pompeii Archaeological Park press office reminded us in a statement released today. Rather, the bready item on the left side of the 2,000-year-old fresco is mensa, a Roman flatbread which served as both a platter for food and food itself.

The food porn fresco was discovered in the Inula 10 of Pompeii's Regio IX, just east of the city's bustling center. Pompeii sits about 15 miles southeast of the modern city of Naples, Italy, which is generally considered the modern birthplace of pizza. Pompeii—now an archaeological site—was erased from maps in 79, when a violent eruption of Mount Vesuvius buried the city in ash.

ITALIAN CARD GAME

SCOPA

A TRADITIONAL

Nearly everyone in Italy has played it at least once in their life, and in small towns it is still common to see people gathered around a table where four elderly are exchanging swear words and bantering over a heated game of Scopa.

The game of Scopa may be easy to learn, but it is difficult to master. Traditionally it is played with a deck of Neapolitan cards.



There are four suits: Coppe (Cups), Ori or Denari (Golds or Coins), Spade (Swords) and Bastoni (Clubs), with face cards ranging from one (the ace) to seven and three figure cards: Knave (Fante in Italian, worth a value of 8), Knight (Cavallo in Italian, worth 9), and King (Re in Italian, worth 10).

The rules are quite simple. Scopa is played with two to four players, or two teams of two players each. https://lifeinitaly.com/scopa-italian-card-game/
